Warm greetings!


As we continue on our journey together, let's celebrate the power of commitment and leadership. Committed leaders inspire others to contribute their best efforts and uphold the key values of our association.




TELL US MORE ABOUT YOUR THEME AND LOGO.



What's your favourite food and drink.


Best circle memory. Any pasta dish, and favorite drink is a Malawian shandy.


When we handed over a fully equipped home economics kitchen to Desai primary school in 2019.

TIKO' S EASY BACON PASTA....

You'll need....

1. Cooked pasta
2. Bacon (fried) and diced
3. Grated cheese (i used cheddar and parmesan)
4. Diced Onions
5. Grated tomatoes
6. A few cloves of crushed garlic
7. Black pepper
8. Fresh parsley

What to do.....

1. In a pan, add a tablespoon of butter or olive oil
2. Fry your bacon (according to how crispy you like it)
3. Set aside the bacon, and fry onions, garlic and tomatoes
4. Add some pepper and a pinch of salt
5. Once cooked, throw in the fried bacon and pasta and stir
6. Once it is well mixed, add in your cheese and parsley to garnish.

W H A T Y O U N E E D .



1. 2 cups flour
2. 2 eggs
3. 1 cup milk
4. 1/2 a cup of sugar (less or more if you wish)
5. 2 leveled teaspoons of baking powder
6. Salt to taste
7. Essence
8. Enough cooking oil to deep fry

W H A T T O D O .

1. Sieve all the dry ingredients together except the sugar
2. In a bowl break the eggs and add the sugar. Mix well till the sugar dissolves. Add the milk and essence.
3. Put a suitable saucepan on the stove and add the oil to heat
4. In the meantime add the dry ingredients to the liquid mixture in a circular motion preferably using a cooking stick
5. N.B: The batter should neither be too light or too thick. So you can either add more milk or more flour to have the perfect mix
6. When the oil heats up use a tablespoon dipped in oil to scoop out the batter to fry. One levelled scoop is enough as big ones don't cook as well as the small ones. Keep turning them until golden brown.

Salva's Creamy Peri-Peri chicken

WHAT YOU NEED .

1. 7 CHICKEN PIECES
2. 1 TABLESPOON OF OIL
3. 1 TABLESPOON OF SEVEN COLOURS GRILL SEASONING
4. 1 TEASPOON OF PAPRIKA
5. 1 TEASPOON OF MIXED HERBS
6. 2 TABLESPOON OF BUTTER
7. 1/4 CUP OF HOT SAUCE
8. 250ML FRESH CREAM
9. 1 TEASPOON HONEY
10. 1 TABLESPOON WORCESTERSHIRE SAUCE
11. 1 TEASPOON PARSLEY
- 12.

METHOD .

1. Wash and pat dry the chicken.
2. Drizzle chicken with oil and season generously with seven colours grill seasoning, paprika and mixed herbs and rub.
3. Bake in a shallow casserole dish or baking tray for 30 to 35 minutes at 180 degrees celsius
4. Remove chicken from dish and set aside.
5. For the sauce, heat the stove to medium heat. In the same casserole dish, add butter, hot sauce, cream, honey and worcestershire sauce.
6. Once the sauce the thickened, return the grilled chicken to the dish and simmer for 3-5 minutes and garnish with parsley.

GET TO KNOW YOUR CONSTITUTION AND GUIDELINES.

GODPARENT RESPONSIBILITIES IN ESTABLISHING A NEW CIRCLE.

Definition of a Godparent Circle

A godparent circle is an established circle responsible for helping set up a new circle. A new circle can only be formed in collaboration with an existing circle or a Round Table.

The godparent circle must inform the Immediate Past President, who serves as the Extension Officer, of any town, city, or area identified as having the potential for a new circle. The Extension Officer will oversee the process and support the godparent circle as necessary.

Responsibilities of the Godparent Circle

Provide Meeting Support: Assist the new (godchild) circle during its meetings to ensure effective and organized discussions.

Project Guidance: Offer support and guidance as the godchild circle undertakes projects.

Chair Meeting of Interest: Preside over meetings of special interest with the godchild circle to foster strong development.

Ensure Meeting Documentation: Verify that the godchild circle maintains transparency by sharing meeting minutes.

Apply for Circle Inauguration: Submit a request to the Immediate Past President for the formal inauguration of the new circle. This can be done after six business meetings or once a strong core group of prospective circlers has been established.

Manage Financial Transactions: Oversee all financial dealings for the circle in formation, including fundraising events. The godparent circle is responsible for recording these transactions and providing a comprehensive financial report to the newly inaugurated circle.

Host Fundraising Events: Organize and host fundraising projects on behalf of the circle in formation.

Guide Charter Meeting Preparation: Offer guidance and support in planning the charter meeting for the official establishment of the new circle.

The godparent circle's role is essential in ensuring the successful formation and sustainability of new circles within the organization.


Strategic Decision Making
